Conference fieldtrips

Two fieldtrips will be held: longer trips on Saturday afternoon, and shorter trips on Sunday afternoon

All fieldtrips are walkable from the conference venue (the visit to Group Architects' Rotherham House in Devonport requires the purchase of a return ticket on the Devonport ferry. The ferry terminal is a 20 minute downhill walk from the conference venue).

There will be no charge for fieldtrips

Choices of trips are available for each day:

Saturday:

- A visit to the site of the Chinese gardens at Carlaw Park, led by archaeologist Hans Bader, who excavated there. The trip would talk about the Chinese community, the excavations, the rope walk, the tannery and the first mill and mill pond, the fish tanks up towards the museum, the railway bridge with the masonry marks, the reclamation made from Sydney sandstone dumped from the first British fort 'Britomart' and then used as the tram service sheds, across the road from the Maori hostel
- A visit to Group Architects' Rotherham House (1951), Devonport, a proposed Category A heritage building on Auckland Council's unitary plan. Requires the purchase of a return ticket on the Devonport ferry.
- A visit to the Symonds St cemetery.

Sunday:

- A walk around the University of Auckland campus, discussing history, architecture, and changing land use
- A visit to the School of Architecture archives

Conference registrations will open in August. Spaces will be limited.
